BACKGROUND

BMI Hospitals are the leading provider of independent health care services in the UK with a focus and reputation for clinical excellence, quality of service and efficiency.

It has 67 hospitals and treatment centres across the country known as BMI Hospitals. It has 9,200 employees, 2900 beds, 1 million outpatient visits per year and 250,000 inpatient visits per year. All hospitals are equipped with state-of-the-art medical equipment and facilities, and all meet stringent quality of care standards.

INTERIM PROCUREMENT REQUIREMENTS

BMI Hospitals have a large procurement requirement which extends right across the procurement of medical equipment to ancillary support services. The procurement team therefore is required to source anything from drugs to the purchase of large volumes of syringes and multi-million pound medical equipment, as well as a multitude of indirect and back office purchases such as hiring agency staff and a host of consumables in order to run the hospitals effectively.

In 2010 BMI had some steep procurement targets to hit and expenditure needed to be monitored much more closely. In order to meet these targets it was determined that the procurement and sourcing department needed to be restructured. BMI was in the process of recruiting a new Director of Sourcing and Property Development and while it searched for the right candidate it felt that interim procurement was needed. Procurement specialist Neil Birkbeck was appointed to help the procurement teams optimise cost base reduction and meet its very challenging targets. Neil came on board and very quickly integrated with the other team members. Initially Neil was hired for a six month project which was extended for over a year. Neil was considered an invaluable support working with the team as well as helping the new Director of Sourcing who once hired had to hit the ground running.
